Reading Questions: Machiavelli, The Prince

- 1. How does Machiavelli characterize the aims of *The Prince* in his letter to his friend, Francesco Vettori?
- 2. How does Machiavelli characterize fortune (*fortuna*) or fate throughout *The Prince*? What attitude does he suggest we take toward it?
- 3. What historical figures does Machiavelli single out for praise? Why? Who does he criticize and why?
- 4. What different means are there for acquiring power, according to Machiavelli? In which of these is he most interested?
- 5. What are the main supports for the authority of a prince, according to Machiavelli?
- 6. How would you characterize Machiavelli's use of history? Choose an historical example he uses in *The Prince* and analyze its significance.
- 7. Think of four or five words that help convey the meaning of Machiavelli's use of the term *virtù*. What qualities go along with it? What qualities are inimical to it? What historical examples does he use to illustrate it?
- 8. How does Machiavelli's use of the term *virtù* differ from a conventional understanding of virtue?
- 9. Compare Machiavelli's treatment of Cesare Borgia and Agathocles of Sicily. What are the important differences between these figures according to Machiavelli? Pay *very* close attention to the discussion of Agathocles in Ch. VIII: does Agathocles have *virtù?*
- 10. What is the relationship between virtù and fortuna according to Machiavelli?
- 11. What is Machiavelli's attitude toward the church? Toward religion?
